

ROHS Compliance

DIRECTIVE 2011/65/EU OF THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT AND OF THE COUNCIL of 8 June 2011

The EU RoHS Directive (2011/65/EU) and the Swiss ChemRRV provide that manufacturers of electrical and electronic equipment and their respective sub-assemblies, components and spare parts must issue a declaration of conformity stating that their products comply with the prohibition on hazardous substances. These obligations have been autonomously implemented into the Swiss ordinance on reduction of chemical risks (ChemRRV), and have thus applied to companies in Switzerland since 1 December 2012.

In particular, the following substances must not exceed the maximum concentration value in homogeneous materials (maximum concentration values tolerated by weight):

In accordance with delegated Directive 2015/863, this list has been expanded to include:

| - bis (2-ethylhexyl) phthalate (DEHP) | 0.1 % |
| - butyl benzyl phthalate (BBP) | 0.1 % |
| - dibutyl phthalate (DBP) | 0.1 % |
| - diisobutyl phthalate (DIBP) | 0.1 %. |
